Agreement
<ul> <li>"I agree with because"</li> <li>"I like what said because"</li> <li>"I agree with; but on the other hand,"</li> </ul>
Disagreement
<ul> <li>"I disagree with because"</li> <li>"I'm not sure I agree with what said because"</li> <li>"I can see that; however, I disagree with (or can't see)"</li> </ul> Clarifications
<ul> <li>"Could you please repeat that for me?"</li> <li>Paraphrase what you heard and ask, "Could you explain a bit more, please?"</li> <li>"I'm not sure I understood you when you said Could you say more about that?"</li> <li>"What's your evidence?"</li> <li>"How does that support our work/mission at?"</li> </ul>
Confirmation
<ul><li>"I think"</li><li>"I believe"</li></ul>
Confusion
<ul><li>"I don't understand"</li><li>"I am confused about"</li></ul>
Extension
<ul> <li>"I was thinking about what said, and I was wondering what if"</li> <li>"This makes me think"</li> <li>"I want to know more about"</li> <li>"Now I am wondering"</li> <li>"Can you tell me more about?"</li> </ul>
Review
"I want to go back to what said."

## **Accountability to the Learning Community**

- a. Careful listening to each other
- b. Using and building on each other's ideas
- c. Paraphrasing and seeking clarification
- d. Respectful disagreement
- e. Using sentence stems

## **Accountability to Accurate Knowledge**

- f. Being as specific and accurate as possible
- g. Resisting the urge to say just "anything that comes to mind."
- h. Getting the facts straight
- i. Challenging questions that demand evidence for claims

#### **Accountability to Rigorous Thinking**

- j. Building arguments
- k. Linking claims and evidence in logical ways
- I. Working to make statements clear
- m. Checking the quality of claims and arguments
